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### A Word From The Chair

Canterbury Players has commenced its 2017/18 season in good health, having had a successful production of Hi de Hi earlier in the summer. Financially it may not have generated as much profit as hoped, but it did have more intangible benefits. These included putting CP on the local stage as part of the Flixton Folk Festival, and also gaining us some new members.

We're now turning our attention to November – which is a play called Kindly Keep it Covered by Dave Freeman. I met him a few times towards the end of his life. He's a good comedy writer having written for the Carry On films and TV series, as well as scripting many sitcoms including Bless This House.



We're almost in a position where we have our two productions for 2018 in place, together with our summer social event – more of these in due course.

The work of the publicity team has been immense over the last couple of months, which will help raise our profile further. We have a number of flyers for the society which we plan to distribute throughout the local area. We also have a pop-up banner at the local library, which will be its permanent home.

Our monthly play readings are also well received – we need to ensure

that members who are not involved in productions are involved in these if they wish, in order to keep them engaged and allow them to feel as if they are part of the society. The nature of our work is that only a handful of people can be involved on stage in our productions, yet we have a lot of others who are keen and enthusiastic, and we need to find ways to keep them involved. Our stage work has continued apace, having cleared and catalogued materials under the stage and getting most of the set in place for the November production.

The challenges over the next few months will be to increase our revenue through increasing audiences at our shows. This is the key for us increasing our income and being able to spend money on productions to make them look even better and get even more positive reactions form audiences. We don't want to make cuts for the sake of making cuts, but we do need to ensure as far as possible our productions are "cost neutral", if not profitable. We do need to maintain the high standard of sets for which Canterbury Players has become known.
